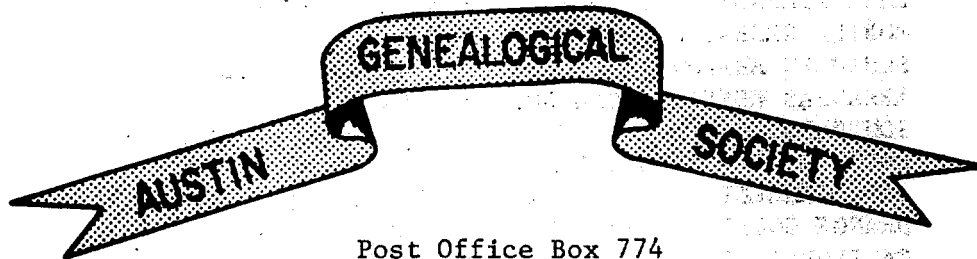

The following records of Company G, 16th Texas Infantry are from an original book in the possession of Mrs. Earnest Jarmon of Austin, Texas. She inherited the book from her grandfather John O. Johnson (Johnston). Some of the pages are missing but seemingly the names of most of the men are intact. We appreciate Mrs. Jarmon's permission to copy these records. She also had the pamphlet compiled by Fred Carleton which immediately follows the Roll.

A newspaper clipping was pasted in the book - which reads as follows:

(written in pencil - Jany. 28, 1916)

CELEBRATES HIS ARRIVAL IN AUSTIN  
City Clerk reached the Capital Fifty-six  
Years Ago in Stage Coach.

The Express Austin Bureau.

Austin, Tex., Jan. 30 - Colonel John O. Johnson, for the past twenty years City Clerk of Austin, today celebrated the fifty-sixth anniversary of his arrival in Austin. He came from Tennessee. In recalling the date of his emigration to Texas, Colonel Johnson told of the various modes of travel that it was necessary to use to reach Austin in those early days. He traveled by wagon, rail, water and stage coach. The last lap of the journey to Austin was made by stage.

"I traveled the first fifty miles from my home in Tennessee by wagon," said Colonel Johnson. "From Jackson, I went to Memphis by rail, and from Memphis to New Orleans by boat. The trip from New Orleans to Galveston was made by steamship, and from Galveston to Houston I traveled aboard a steamer. The trip from Houston to Hempstead was made by rail and I came from Hempstead to Austin by stage coach at the rate of 15 cents a mile, and at that I walked a big part of the way, carrying a rail with which to pry the coach out of the mud."

Colonel Johnson has resided continuously in Austin for the last fifty-six years.

Capt. Fred W. Moores G Company was in Col. George Flournay's Reg. of Texas Volunteers. It was called into the service of the Confederate States in the Provisional Army under the provisions of the Act of Congress, passed Feb. 1861 from the 15th day of March 1862 (date of this muster) for the term of three years or the War. (Texas State Archives; Muster Roll #1632.)

The 16th Texas Infantry Regiment was assigned to John G. Walker's Division the latter part of the War and fought in Banks' Red River Campaign during the spring of 1864. The Regiment did particularly effective work at Mansfield (La.) on April 8, 1864 and Pleasant Hill (La.) on April 9, 1864. (Texas in the War 1861-1865 by Marcus J. Wright)

OFFICERS.

- Fred W. Moore, Captain, appointed on staff duty sometime in 1864; died in Austin, Texas, sometime after war.
- C. F. Millett, First Lieutenant; became Captain on the appointment of Captain Moore, in 1864, to staff position; died in Austin after war.
- John Davidson, Second Lieutenant, became First Lieutenant on promotion of C. F. Millett to Captain; died in Austin after war.
- John M. Smith, Third Lieutenant; died in service in Arkansas.
- John O. Johnson, First Sergeant, became Third Lieutenant on death of John M. Smith, afterwards promoted Second Lieutenant on promotion of John Davidson; living in Austin, Texas.
- R. M. Wilcox, Second Sergeant; died in service at Camp Nelson, Ark.
- George W. Powell, Third Sergeant, became First Sergeant on promotion of Johnson, afterwards on promotion of Johnson to Second Lieutenant became Third Lieutenant; now living in Bastrop county.
- M. G. Duce, Fourth Sergeant, now living near Elgin, Texas; is a Presbyterian preacher.
- James T. Brown, Fifth Sergeant, appointed wagon master of the regiment very soon after its organization; now an inmate of the Confederate Home at Austin, Texas.
- John Harrell, First Corporal; now living above Austin, Texas, in the mountains.
- W. W. Maderis, Second Corporal, afterwards Assistant Surgeon of the regiment; now living near Creedmoor, Travis county, Texas.
- Fred Carleton, Third Corporal, became Fifth Sergeant on retirement of J. T. Brown, afterwards became Third Sergeant on promotion of Powell to First Sergeant; now living at Austin, Texas.
- George T. Boardman, Fourth Corporal; died after the war at Austin, Texas.

PRIVATES.

- Bryan (physician), has not been heard from since war.
- W. B. Banks, said to be living in Mexico.
- Powhattan Bell, died in San Antonio, Texas, after the war.
- John Biehl, killed at Milliken's Bend June 7, 1863.
- John Brown, said to be living in California.
- James A. Berry, died at his home near Austin, Texas, after the war.
